A HEARTWARMING ADOPTION TALE OWL FINDS HIS FOREVER HOME

Owl came to WCAL as part of a malnourished, underage litter of pups that were being sold on the side of the road for gas money. His story is a testament to the power of compassion and the unwavering dedication of our small but mighty rescue organization. If our volunteers hadn't jumped into action, what became a story of hope and triumph could have been very different.

The road to Owl's new life was not without its trials. He and his 11 siblings were taken from their mother too early and had been living together in a car, barely subsisting on a diet of Slim Jims and KoolAid. The scene was horrific. After being entrusted to WCAL, they were bathed and quickly settled into a foster home where they eagerly tasted their first canned food. These puppies had been exposed to both Giardia and Parvovirus and four of the twelve pups were in such bad shape that despite all interventions, they did not survive. This heartache weighed heavy on the hearts of their fosters. Thankfully, Owl emerged as one of the lucky ones.

Owl, with his stunning all-white coat, spotted nose and floppy ears, was born deaf. His snuggly personality quickly captured the hearts of all those who met him. His foster family knew he was something special from the moment they laid eyes on him and were willing to do whatever it took to accommodate his special needs.

Growing up in his foster home, Owl's spirit shone brightly. He was always ready for a good time, eagerly seeking attention and showering his humans with affection. A quick learner, Owl easily mastered a few hand signs early on. When he wasn't busy chewing sticks or roughhousing with his brothers, there was one spot that held a special place in Owl's heart – an orange chair that became his favorite lounge spot.

Owl's unique qualities, his sweetness, cleverness, and silliness, endeared him to everyone he met. His deafness ensured that he could sleep soundly

through household noises and required a bit of extra care when playing with his siblings because he didn't hear their pleading yips for mercy. It also meant he could focus on tasks with incredible determination.

Owl's journey led him to a family that recognized his potential, a family who was ready for the challenge of raising a deaf dog. They embraced him wholeheartedly, knowing that with their love and guidance, Owl would thrive.

This lucky puppy went home with two other WCAL alums, Clover and Windsor, and their dedicated pet parents. His new family did their research and learned all they could about raising a deaf dog. Their other dogs have both attended reward based classes and now they are acting as Owl's mentors and companions.

Today, Owl is no longer that malnourished pup rescued from an impossible situation. He is a symbol of resilience, love, and second chances. Owl's story is a reminder that every dog, regardless of their unique challenges, has the potential to become an incredible companion, a loyal friend, and an unwavering source of love.



CLIFFORD: THE SNUGGLY RED DOG

We learned about Clifford when he was just an 11-weekold puppy, being given away in front of a store in Lake County. Thanks to the intervention of a kind-hearted good Samaritan, he was rescued and brought to Wine Country Animal Lovers, where he got a second chance.

Upon arriving at WCAL, Clifford's breed mix was uncertain, but one thing was clear - he was 100% pure Snuggleupagus. All he craved was love, cuddles, and peanut butter. Clifford excelled at spooning and snuggling. We got him treated for Giardia and he quickly started putting on weight. Once he was healthy, he was able to spend time in three different WCAL foster homes, socializing with kids, dogs and cats. Our fosters put in a lot of time helping their young canine house guests master potty training, leash skills and other important life skills intended to set them up for success. His perfect family then submitted their adoption application.

For Kayla and Shay, it was love at first sight when they met Clifford. Kayla's striking red hair perfectly matched Clifford's shiny red coat, and he immediately claimed his spot in their home. Now he's almost a year old and Clifford has become an essential part of their family.

They describe Clifford as the sweetest dog ever, with no mean bone in his body. He adores playing with other dogs and cats and wants to be included in every activity. Clifford even accompanies Shay to work and shares his home with two adult cats, one of whom loves romping around with him.

As part of the adoption commitment from WCAL, Clifford's new family signed up to attend puppy training classes with him. Studies show that puppies who have the opportunity to attend reward based training classes with their humans are more likely to stay with their family in the long term than untrained dogs who are commonly surrendered to shelters when they begin to struggle in adolescence. Clifford continues to practice at home daily and it shows! His talents now include sit, shake, lay down, and rollover. He's even learned how to swim, which he absolutely loves.

Clifford's DNA test revealed his ancestry: 45.7% American Pit Bull Terrier, 24.8% American Staffordshire Terrier, 16.7% German Shepherd Dog, 6.5% Bulldog and 6.3% Boxer. He enjoys playing with his best dog friend, Luna, walking with Kayla, and playing fetch.

His role in Kayla's recent proposal to Shay makes Clifford even more endearing. Kayla set up a tripod at the beach under the guise of taking pictures of Clifford, but it was all a clever distraction to surprise Shay with a proposal. It worked like a charm!

As Kayla and Shay look ahead, they're planning for Clifford to walk Kayla down the aisle in an adorable little suit. "He makes my heart smile. I can't describe it. He's exactly what we needed," says Kayla. And one thing is certain: Clifford's favorite treat is still peanut butter.

IZZY: FROM FeLV POSITIVE TO HAPPINESS

Alison was a recent empty nester with her youngest setting off for college, and her whole household was mourning the loss of their beloved 2-year-old calico when she chanced upon Izzy's photo online. "I saw Izzy's picture online and fell in love," Alison remembers. She knew this spunky kitten was exactly what their lonely young cat needed, too.

Izzy had to overcome a few obstacles to reach adoption day. This adorable, sweet orphan was found alone and brought to Clearlake Animal Shelter as a tiny baby. She was transferred to WCAL's care to be bottle-fed by our volunteers. This neonatal orphan was a feisty girl who never had any issues or symptoms of illness, so we were surprised when she tested positive for FeLV on spay day. Feline Leukemia

affects 2-3% of all cats in the US, and it can't be transmitted to humans or dogs, but it sure does sound scary. Many adopters would have changed their minds about bringing home a kitty who was potentially going to become ill or who might not live as long as other cats, but Izzy's humans decided she was worth it. "WCAL offered to send Izzy back to her foster home, which we couldn't do because we fell in love overnight and were so excited to bring her home," explains Alison.

WCAL's program director explained that there was a good chance that Izzy's body would eventually overcome the virus and suggested retesting her monthly. Fast forward four weeks, and we got the results we were hoping for, she tested FeLV negative! Izzy was most likely born to a FeLV+ mama cat

and exposed during birth, but we can't know for sure. Today, this kitty is happy and adored! "Izzy is my favorite snuggler, " exclaims Alison. If we could all be as optimistic and accepting



as Izzy's adopters, the world would be a kinder and better place. A diagnosis of Feline Leukemia used to be an automatic death sentence for cats. Now there is more information about what to expect when adopting a FeLV+ cat, and we're grateful that more families are opting to give kitties who test positive a chance at a happily ever after.
